EMPOWERING ENTREPRENEURS THROUGH DIGITAL INNOVATION

In a bid to strengthen entrepreneurship and support small businesses across Uganda, sensitization campaigns have been rolled out in Fort Portal, Hoima, and Wakiso to promote two powerful digital tools: the E-starters platform and the Yo-kazzi mobile application. These initiatives are transforming how entrepreneurs access knowledge, plan their ventures, and connect with essential services.

The E-starters platform is designed to guide new and existing entrepreneurs through the process of developing a business plan. It also features a rich collection of instructional videos that break down the key requirements for starting different types of businesses—from registration and compliance to sourcing and operations. These step-by-step guides make the platform an ideal resource for first-time business owners looking for clear and practical advice.





Meanwhile, the Yo-kazzi app serves as a digital marketplace and service connector. Entrepreneurs can use the app to find a variety of service providers, such as accountants, legal advisors, designers, and more. Just as importantly, users can also list their own services, helping them reach new customers and expand their networks within Uganda's growing digital economy.

The sensitization activities, led by the Uganda Small Scale Industries Association (USSIA), focused on hands-on demonstrations and practical engagement with participants. Entrepreneurs in each district were shown how to navigate the platforms, set up their profiles, and begin using the tools immediately to enhance their businesses.

EQUIPPING THE FRONTLINE: PREPARING ENUMERATORS FOR ACTION

In preparation for a critical data collection exercise under the Livelihoods and Employment for Development (LEAD) Project, a group of dedicated enumerators has completed a targeted training program in Kyaka II Settlement, located in western Uganda. This marks a major step in ensuring that data collected from the field is accurate, reliable, and reflective of the realities within both the refugee and host communities.

The training, equipped the enumerators with practical skills in digital data collection, ethical interviewing techniques, and understanding of the project's scope. Enumerators were introduced to mobile survey tools and guided through mock interviews to ensure readiness for the upcoming household-level assessments.

Trainers emphasized the importance of confidentiality, and consistency integrity, data collection throughout the process. "Quality data is the foundation of impactful programming. By investing in well-prepared enumerators, we are laying the groundwork for interventions that truly respond to community realities," one facilitator noted.

As the enumerators gear up for fieldwork, the training has instilled both competence and confidence—ensuring that voices from Kyaka II are heard and accurately represented in shaping future development interventions under the LEAD Project.

Building Momentum for a Greener Future

Local leaders, stakeholders, and community representatives gathered in Kabarole District for the official inception meeting of the Green Deal Project, marking the beginning of a transformative initiative aimed at promoting inclusive green growth, environmental sustainability, and livelihood enhancement in the region.

The meeting served as a platform to introduce the project's objectives, implementation strategies, and expected outcomes to key actors across government, civil society, and the private sector. With a strong emphasis on collaboration, the session fostered dialogue around how the project can best align with district development plans, community priorities, and ongoing environmental efforts.

This soft skills training complements the technical courses offered through the Get Skilled Project ensuring that beneficiaries don't just gain skills in trades such as tailoring, mechanics, or hairdressing, but are also prepared to manage income, make informed financial decisions, and pursue self-employment with confidence.

Many participants expressed appreciation for the training, noting that it challenged them to rethink their habits and embrace entrepreneurship as a viable path to independence.

The Get Skilled Project continues to address youth unemployment by combining hands-on vocational training with the soft skills necessary for long-term success. As Cohort 4 progresses, the impact of these lessons in savings and entrepreneurship is expected to ripple through households and communities, fostering a generation of financially literate, self-driven young entrepreneurs.

Empowering Potential Beyond Technical Skills

Youth participants under Cohort 4 of the Get Skilled Project in Wakiso, Mukono, and Kampala have completed a transformative training in soft skills, focusing on financial literacy, savings culture, and entrepreneurship. This training is a core component of the broader initiative aimed at not only equipping young people with vocational skills but also preparing them for the realities of business and self-employment.

The sessions emphasized essential life and work-readiness skills that are often overlooked in traditional training programs. Youth were introduced to practical techniques in personal finance management, goal setting, budgeting, and the discipline of consistent saving. The entrepreneurship module guided them through idea generation, business planning, customer relations, and the mindset needed to start and sustain a small enterprise.





Member Visits Highlight Youth Empowerment and Innovation in Carpentry in Fort Portal

A recent membership engagement visit to Imukya Initiatives and Universal Construction Company in Fort Portal shone a spotlight on how local enterprises are using carpentry and construction not only as business ventures but also as platforms for youth empowerment and skills development.

Both companies are active members of the Uganda Small Scale Industries Association (USSIA) and serve as vital contributors to the region's vocational training ecosystem.



Imukya Initiatives stands out for its innovative use of bamboo in creating eco-friendly furniture and household items. During the visit, members observed the production process of bamboo chairs, tables, and decorative pieces highlighting the potential of sustainable materials in Uganda's carpentry sector. In addition to its bamboo work, Imukya runs a training program that targets vulnerable youth, offering them free or subsidized carpentry training to increase their economic independence.



Universal Construction Company continues to make an impact through its structured apprenticeship programs. Trainees work under skilled artisans to learn furniture making, cabinetry, and structural woodwork, with many transitioning into employment or starting their own workshops after graduation. The company also contributes to the local economy by sourcing materials locally and employing workers from within the community.

These membership visits served as an opportunity to deepen engagement, identify areas of support, and share best practices among other small-scale industrialists in the region.


