During the launch, USSIA joined other key stakeholders in reaffirming the importance of empowering women entrepreneurs with the tools, knowledge, and networks they need to succeed. By integrating green practices into their enterprises, UWEP women groups will not only improve their productivity but also contribute to environmental sustainability.





The WEEG-UWEP project emphasizes creating inclusive spaces where women can innovate, expand their markets, and access better economic opportunities, all while balancing social and environmental responsibilities. USSIA's participation reflects its continued commitment to supporting women-led enterprises and advancing gender equity in Uganda's small-scale industries.

This partnership marks a significant step toward building a competitive, inclusive, and sustainable future—one where women are at the forefront of driving green growth and social transformation.

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The training is designed to equip participants not only with entrepreneurial knowledge but also with essential life skills that prepare them for the demands of both business and community development. Through interactive sessions, the youth are gaining exposure to practical tools for financial management, critical thinking, leadership, and adaptability—skills vital for thriving in today's competitive world.

What makes the Greendeal Project unique is its forward-looking approach. Upon completion of the life skills component, the trainees will transition into technical training placements across 28 Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs). These specialized trainings will focus on high-demand trades such as solar energy, eco-friendly construction using interlocking blocks, sustainable bamboo carpentry, and innovative waste management practices.

## Shaping Tomorrow's Entrepreneurs

The We work (Green deal) Project has entered its second week of Entrepreneurship and Life Skills Training, bringing together more than 435 energetic youths from Hoima, Kyegegwa, and Fort Portal. This initiative, supported by the Uganda Small Scale Industries Association (USSIA) as the lead implementing partner, is laying a strong foundation for the next generation of changemakers.

By connecting entrepreneurship with green skills and sustainable trades, the project is not only tackling youth unemployment but also fostering eco-conscious innovation that responds to global sustainability challenges. The ripple effect is expected to create jobs, promote cleaner technologies, and enhance livelihoods in the participating districts.









## **Businesses and Stakeholders Voice Electricity Concerns in Mbarara**

A one-day electricity workshop was held at the Electricity Regulatory Authority's (ERA) regional office in Mbarara, bringing together the business community and stakeholders to address pressing electricity-related issues. The interactive session created a platform for participants to raise concerns ranging from billing challenges, power reliability, connection delays, to customer care experiences.

The workshop provided an opportunity for ERA officials to listen directly to the affected communities while also clarifying regulatory processes and commitments to improved service delivery. This open engagement emphasized the importance of collaboration between electricity providers, regulators, and end-users in finding sustainable solutions.

Among the participants were six members of the Uganda Small Scale Industries Association (USSIA), whose contributions highlighted the unique challenges faced by small and medium enterprises. Reliable electricity remains a critical factor in the growth and competitiveness of such businesses, making their involvement in the discussions highly valuable.

By the close of the workshop, participants expressed optimism that continued dialogue would not only resolve existing complaints but also build stronger partnerships to ensure more reliable and transparent electricity services across the region.





#### **BLINC Workshop Charts New Path for Inclusive Trade and Investment in Uganda**

A new strategic direction for Uganda's trade and investment landscape was set at the Business Linkages and Investment Connections (BLINC) Strategic Planning Workshop held at Esella Country Hotel, Kampala, from 16th–17th August 2025. Convened by the Civil Society Budget Advocacy Group (CSBAG), the workshop brought together key stakeholders including the Uganda Small Scale Industries Association (USSIA) to codesign a roadmap aimed at strengthening business linkages and fostering inclusive economic growth.

Key discussions underscored the challenges facing Uganda's business ecosystem, including weak value chains, high SME mortality rates, limited access to affordable financing, and persistent informality. It was noted that despite existing funds such as those from UDB and the Agricultural Credit Facility, many SMEs remain strict excluded collateral and documentation requirements.



The BLINC initiative seeks to create a structured platform for promoting trade, investment, and economic opportunities by linking government, private sector actors, and investors. Its overall goal is to enhance private sector participation while that small and medium ensuring enterprises (SMEs), women, and youth are actively engaged in Uganda's growth agenda.



Opportunities were highlighted, such as the need for stronger economic diplomacy, the creation of public free zones spur exports, and development of centralized knowledge platforms to connect **SMEs** information on financing and trade opportunities. The revival of cooperatives was also emphasized as a strategy to improve aggregation, and input access,





## Petrochemical Prospects Poised to Transform Uganda's Manufacturing Sector

Uganda's journey toward industrial selfsufficiency gained momentum on 14th August during a high-level dialogue petrochemical raw materials and the future of manufacturing. held at the Uganda Manufacturers Association (UMA) Multipurpose Hall. Organized in partnership with the Petroleum Authority of Uganda (PAU) and Uganda National Oil Company (UNOC), the event brought together industry stakeholders to explore how the forthcoming Hoima Refinery could reshape the country's industrial base.

The refinery, expected to be operational by 2030, will not only supply refined fuel but also produce vital petrochemical feedstocks—such as plastics, resins, and chemicals—currently imported at high cost. This development is anticipated to reduce dependency on foreign markets, cut foreign exchange outflows, and provide affordable, locally available raw materials for diverse industries ranging from plastics and fertilizers to paints, automotive parts, and cosmetics.



For small-scale industries, the refinery presents enormous opportunities—lower production costs, wider access to raw materials, and potential entry into new downstream investments. However, it also calls for deliberate preparation. USSIA underscored the importance of capacity-building, access to financing for technology adoption, and policy measures to guarantee SMEs equitable access to refinery outputs.



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For many participants, the highlight was discovering that financial management isn't about complex accounting jargon, but about developing the discipline to turn small, consistent actions into lasting impact. The training instilled not only skills but also the confidence to transform challenges into opportunities.

By the end of the day, the atmosphere was filled with optimism. The entrepreneurs left not only with new skills but also with the confidence to apply them in their businesses, laying a foundation for stronger, more sustainable enterprises.

#### **Entrepreneurs Sharpen Financial Skills**

In the USSIA boardroom, a new chapter of unfolded business growth entrepreneurs that were comprised of 21 women and 11 men, gathered for a dynamic financial management training focused on financial planning and budgeting. The session was more than just a it was an eye-opener on how numbers, when managed wisely, can shape the future of a business.

Participants explored the "money map" of their enterprises, learning how to track every shilling, design budgets that work like roadmaps, and plan ahead with confidence. The training went beyond theory, using real-life business scenarios that encouraged entrepreneurs to think critically about their financial decisions and the ripple effects these decisions have on sustainability.

The visit also provided an opportunity to discuss challenges faced by herbal producers, including certification requirements, access to financing, and market penetration.

Beyond Wakiso, four other member enterprises in Kampala were also visited, each showcasing unique contributions to Uganda's industrial landscape. These enterprises demonstrated the creativity and determination of small-scale industries, ranging from food processing and value addition to craft production and manufacturing. The discussions centered on practical solutions to everyday business challenges, while also highlighting the need for capacity building, market access, and policy support.
