#### LEAD Project Trainings Ignite in Kyaka

Energy and ambition are taking center stage in Kyaka Refugee Settlement, where the LEAD Project has kicked off a transformative training journey for 168 youths drawn from both refugee and host communities. Over the next five weeks, these young men and women will be immersed in a dynamic program combining entrepreneurship, life skills, and Village Savings and Loan Association (VSLA) training.

The sessions are designed to build more than just skills—they are cultivating resilience, creativity, and a spirit of self-reliance. By learning how to identify opportunities, manage resources, and collaborate effectively, the participants are being equipped to craft sustainable livelihoods that can withstand today's challenges and tomorrow's uncertainties.

For many of these youths, this training represents a turning point: a chance to gain hands-on entrepreneurial knowledge, sharpen essential life skills, and understand the power of collective savings through VSLA. More importantly, it strengthens the bonds between refugee and host communities, demonstrating that shared learning and cooperation are the foundation peaceful coexistence and economic growth.

The ongoing training is more than a classroom exercise—it is an incubator for future leaders, innovators, and changemakers. With every session, the participants are stepping closer to unlocking their potential and rewriting their stories of possibility and progress.





#### **Building Capacity for Success**

A new wave of empowerment is taking root in Kyaka and Nakivale Refugee Settlements, where the LEAD Project has successfully completed Training of Trainers (TOT) sessions for a select group of passionate facilitators. In total, \*\*8 from each settlement—\*\*were trainers—4 equipped with advanced knowledge and skills in entrepreneurship, life skills, and Village Savings and Loan Association (VSLA) methodologies.

This initiative marks a critical step in ensuring sustainability and wider outreach. By investing in trainers who live and work within communities, the LEAD Project is building a multiplier effect—where knowledge cascades from a few to many, empowering more youths and self-reliance households embrace innovation.



The TOT sessions were not simply about delivering content; they emphasized interactive facilitation, practical exercises, and real-world application. **Trainers** learned how to inspire participants, nurture entrepreneurial thinking, and cultivate financial discipline VSLA structures, while also guiding young people on essential life skills for resilience and leadership.



With this cadre of well-prepared trainers now in place, both Kyaka and Nakivale are set to benefit from high-quality, localized training that responds directly to the needs of the communities. These trainers will play a pivotal role in mentoring, coaching, and supporting youths through the LEAD Project's fiveweek training cycles and beyond.





#### Building Trust, Securing Quality

Before the first lesson is taught and the first tool is handed over, the LEAD Project is ensuring that quality and accountability are at the heart of its work. In both Kyaka and Nakivale Refugee Settlements, thorough due diligence visits were carried out at various Technical Trainers' Centres ahead of contract signing—an exercise that underscored the project's commitment to excellence and transparency.

The visits provided an opportunity to assess the readiness, capacity, and credibility of trainers and institutions that will play a central role in shaping the skills of refugee and host youths. Criteria such as technical expertise, training facilities, mentorship capacity, and alignment with LEAD's mission of empowerment were carefully evaluated.

The outcome speaks volumes: following this meticulous process, over 34 technical trainers were contracted across the two settlements. These trainers will deliver hands-on instruction in areas ranging from vocational skills to entrepreneurship, life skills, and Village Savings and Loan Association (VSLA) practices—equipping young people with the tools they need for meaningful livelihoods.



By prioritizing due diligence, the LEAD Project is not only safeguarding quality training but also building trust among partners, trainees, and the wider community. Each contracted trainer now represents more than an instructor—they are trusted change agents tasked with sparking innovation, self-reliance, and resilience among the youths.
